Tiffany's work with the Department of Human Services, Alcohol and Other Drug Project (CJI-AOD) and Prevent Child Abuse Minnesota (PCAMN) has helped identify ways to improve court-related performance and outcomes for children and families involved in child protection court proceedings. She has been a volunteer Parent Leader in the state of Minnesota for over eight years as well as a member of a statewide parent leadership team that brings the parents voice to committees and workgroups focused on child welfare policy and practice. As a parent leader, Tiffany is currently working as part of Olmsted County's Executive Steering Committee for Chadwick Trauma-Informed Systems Project Dissemination and Implementation and the Think Families Grant Project. Tiffany is very committed to her own personal recovery and has contributed greatly to the local recovery community.
