### What is a ROSC?

Recovery Oriented systems support person centered and self-directed approaches to care that build on the strengths and resilience of individuals, families, and communities to take responsibility for their sustained health, wellness, and recovery from alcohol and drug problems.

Recovery-oriented systems of care (ROSC) are networks of formal and informal services developed and mobilized to sustain longterm recovery for individuals and families impacted by severe substance use disorders. The system in ROSC is not a treatment agency, but a macro level organization of a community, a state or a nation.

### 7 Building Blocks of a ROSC

- 1. Aligning treatment with a ROSC
- 2. Fully integrating Peer and other Recovery Support Services
- 3. Supporting the development of a mobilized activated Recovery Community.
- 4. Recovery-oriented performance improvement and evaluation
- 5. individualized, Evidence-based services (appropriate to Trauma, Culture, Gender, etc)

### 7 Building Blocks of a ROSC

- Focus on Prevention and Early Intervention through Promotion of population and community health.
- 7. Fiscal Policy, Regulatory and Administrative Alignment

- Person-centered
- Self-directed
- Strength-based
- Participation of family members, caregivers, significant others, friends, community
- Individualized, comprehensive services and supports
- Community-based services and supports



#### **OPERATIONAL ELEMENTS OF A ROSC**

- Collaborative decision-making
- Continuity of services & supports
- Service quality & responsiveness
- Multiple stakeholder involvement
- Recovery community/peer involvement
  - Outcomes-driven
  - For the individual
  - For the system



## Recovery-Oriented Systems of Care shifts the question from

"How do we get the client into treatment?" to

"How do we support the process of recovery within the person's life and environment?"








## Social Network Site

## Questions to Ask Yourself Before Posting

- What are the costs and benefits of posting the information?
- Is there a high probability that clients will be significantly and negatively affected?
- How will the disclosure affect my relationship with my clients?
- Does the disclosure threaten my credibility or undermine the public's trust in the field of counseling?


## More than one-third of cell phone users


have sent a text

"Traditional Short Message Service (SMS) text messaging is non-secure and noncompliant with safety and privacy regulations under HIPAA. Messages containing ePHI can be read by anyone, forwarded to anyone, remain unencrypted on telecommunication providers' servers, and stay forever on sender's and receiver's phones."
